I grew up in a small town and in 1945 was down with typhoid. Many died of typhoid, there was no streptomycin.

I was seven years old and not expected to survive. And was being treated by a local doctor (LME)

God decided that I should survive

I actually wanted to study Medicine but was under age. Ended up being a civil engineer.

I know that my education was subsidised by the society,

I have certainly not made the kind of contribution to the society you too have made.

I have been lucky enough to work for an organisation sincerely committed to ethical conduct and not being a party to any project that we perceived to be against the interest of our nation.

I too have learned many things listening to people who may just be construction worker or a mistry. This always made me feel very humble; their experience has taught them things that cannot be taught in engineering schools. I encourage our young engineers that they should be patient when they visit construction sites and listen to what people have to say ... no matter they are not engineering graduates.
